A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR

Dearest family;

It is so hard to believe that Thanksgiving is just a month away. It made me wonder; are we thankful? I mean really thankful for all God has provided.

"Enter his gates with thanksgiving and enter his courts with praise; give thanks to him and praise his name."

Psalm 100:4

This short verse talks about thanksgiving and praise. I don't think it is an accident that thanksgiving comes first. If we aren't grateful for God's numerous provisions, how can we praise Him? When we enter the sanctuary each Sunday, we should give Him thanks and then we can truly praise Him when we remember all He has done for us.

Back in 1860, a boat on Lake Michigan collided with a freighter and began to sink less than a mile from the shore. Hundreds of passengers began screaming as they leaped into the icy water.

Edward Spencer was a student at a nearby seminary and he ran down to the beach to see what he could do. He was a strong swimmer and for six hours Spencer swam out and back, pulling people ashore as he battled stormy waves and the powerful undertow. By dawn, he had personally rescued 15 people in as many trips. Exhausted, he sat down until he spotted two more people still in the water.

Spencer dove in again and found a man and a woman clinging desperately to a piece of wreckage. He brought them in and then collapsed on the beach. Out of 393 passengers, only one-quarter were rescued, and seventeen were saved by Edward Spencer.

His health, however, was permanently damaged by his act of heroism. He was never able to return to school and ultimately lived out his days as an invalid. Years later, a reporter doing a story on Great Lakes tragedies found Spencer in a nursing home in California and

However, thousands of innocent lives, both Israeli and Palestinian are being taken due to the attack from a terrorist organization, Hamas. Hamas is not Palestine and does not represent the interest of the thousands of Palestinian people, including Palestinian Christians. We should pray for peace for all in the region and protection from the horrors of terrorist organizations like Hamas. Acting Stated Clerk condemns violence between Israel and Hamas

Bronwen Boswell calls for immediate end to bloodshed

Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) - October 13, 2023

Deuteronomy 5:17 "You shall not kill."

The devastation and loss of life in both Israel and the Gaza Strip in the last few days has been horrific. No words can describe the anguish and suffering of the people directly impacted by and caught up in the violence of these attacks. As we watch the recently declared war unfold, our hearts break for all whose loved ones have died, are wounded, missing, displaced, or taken hostage.

Horrific actions committed by Hamas and the violent response by Israel have exacerbated deep wounds, inflicting physical and emotional pain and suffering. We acknowledge that the people of Palestine and Hamas are not one in the same, and we stand in solidarity with the people of Palestine and Israel who seek peace. Hamas does not. We condemn the violence that has taken place in recent days, and we grieve the decades of oppression that have led to this violence.



The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) stands firm in its support of Palestinians and their right to live free in their land, without occupation, aggression, and bloodshed. We support and protect Israel's right to exist as a free and sovereign nation. In the Confession of 67, the church states:

9.45 b: The church, in its own life, is called to practice the forgiveness of enemies and to commend to the nations as practical politics the search for cooperation and peace.

9.46 c: The reconciliation of humankind through Jesus Christ makes it plain that enslaving poverty in a world of abundance is an intolerable violation of God's good creation.

Hamas has caused significant damage and destruction to Israeli towns. Israeli bombings are leveling entire neighborhoods in Gaza, leaving survivors with a lack of shelter, adequate food, water, and necessities. Hospitals are losing power, putting the health of the injured, newborns, and others at risk.

The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) urges the Israeli government to honor the Palestinian people with the same freedom they offer their own citizens and continue to do so amid this crisis. We also urge Hamas to release the hostages and refrain from additional violence. Regardless of our differences and strong views on matters of human rights, bombing innocent people, killing, and kidnapping children are never acceptable.

We urge all leaders to immediately put an end to the bloodshed, release those who are captured and held hostage, end the fighting, and open humanitarian corridors to get medical attention to everyone who is in need. We recognize that this is a very difficult and and open humanitarian corridors to get medical attention to everyone who is in need. We recognize that this is a very difficult and painful matter that generates strong emotions and reactions. Earlier this week, the Office of the Stated Clerk issued a call for prayer as an immediate response to the tragedy. Since then, we have been thoughtful and prayerful in discerning what to say and have worked with our colleagues who are closest to this unfolding crisis. The prayer has been taken down with this new response. The PC(USA) Office of Public Witness has also issued a Statement of Lament for Israel and Palestine.

A DAY TO HONOR OUR VETERANS



On November 11, 1918, the Germans and the Allied Nations, which included the United States, signed a document to initiate an armistice (cessation of hostilities), thus ending World War I. A year later, President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation designating November 11 as Armistice Day. It was to be a day of reflection — a day to remember those who died in the country's service and to offer Americans the opportunity "to show sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nation."

Wanting to recognize more specifically America's veterans, Congress passed a bill changing the name of the day from Armistice Day to Veterans Day. The change was made in May 1954.

On this national holiday, churches around the nation hold services of prayers and praise. Followers of the Prince of Peace pray for peace among the nations of Earth and for the day when "they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more" (Isaiah 2:4, NRSV).

On December 16, 2023, at 12:00 p.m., we will be holding our ceremony, along with the ceremony for Slippery Rock Cemetery, at the Crossroads Baptist Church located at 302 Harmony Road in Slippery Rock, PA. This ceremony is to Remember and Honor our veterans through the laying of Remembrance wreaths for each branch of the armed services and POW/MIA. Following the ceremony, we ask those who are placing wreaths to travel to the Slippery Rock Cemetery to place the wreaths and following Slippery Rock Cemetery travel to Wolf Creek Cemetery to place wreaths for that location. At each cemetery we will Remember and Honor our veterans through the laying of Remembrance wreaths on the graves of our country's fallen heroes and the act of saying the name of each and every veteran aloud.

Following the placing of wreaths at Wolf Creek all are welcome to enter the Friendship Church Community Center for a time of reflection on why we gathered this day and refreshments.


