

YOUNG ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL:


The young adult Sunday school class will be studying from Acts., Galatians, and I Corinthians. They will be studying humility.

SILENT NIGHT, HOLY NIGHT....Do you know that if it were not for a broken organ, this beautiful Christmas carol would not have been written? In 1818 near Salzburg, preparing for Christmas Eve, the priest of the Church of St. Nicholas was quite upset when he found that the church organ was broken, thus ruining the playing of the planned music. He was inspired to write a new song that could be sung without the organ. He took it to his organist who wrote a simple tune to go with the words. And so, on December 24, 1818 "Silent Night" was sung for the first time and was accompanied by guitar. The organ repairman heard about this and took a copy of the music and spread it around the Alpine region of Austria. A family of glove makers heard the song and started to use it at various festivals and fairs having their 4 children sign it to attract customers. Their singing caught the attention of many including the king and queen who asked the children to give them a royal performance. And now it's a famous, much loved Christmas hymn. It was first published for congregational singing in 1838. German-speaking congregations in America used the hymn. It appeared in its current English form in 1863 in a book of Sunday School songs.

THE STORY OF THE CANDY CANE

Look at the candy cane. What do you see?

A candy maker wanted to make a candy that would be a witness for his Savior, so he made the Christmas Candy cane. He began with a stick of pure white, hard candy, which symbolizes the Virgin Birth and sinless nature of Jesus. The hardness symbolizes the Solid Rock and firmness of the promises of God. He then formed the candy into a "J" for Jesus our Savior (John 3:16-17) and the staff of our Good Shepherd. He stained it with three small, red stripes representing the scourging Jesus received prior to His crucifixion for our healing. He added one large red stripe to represent the shedding of His blood on the cross for our salvation.

Many of us set New Year's resolutions for self-improvement, asking, "What are my goals? How can I better myself, my weight, my worklife balance, my habits?" But Nouwen said of his selfinquiry: "These are the real questions. I must trust that the little bit of love that I sow now will bear many fruits, here in this world and [in] the life to come." 
